The Book Nook

"Where can we hear some live fiddle music?" "What's the story behind that lighthouse on Kidston Island?" "How in the world do I open a lobster?" These are the kinds of questions Baddeck Library staff hear frequently over the summer, as the Village welcomes its annual influx of tourists and seasonal residents. We hear these questions so frequently, in fact, that we've created a summer-long program series around them!

The Summer Welcome Program Series will run every Thursday evening at 6:30 p.m. at Baddeck Library, from July 8 through August 26. The programs - presented by area residents - are free, informative, and informal talks on local history, ecology, music, and more, and are meant to be of interest to local folks and visitors alike. We're hoping the sessions will provide an opportunity for visitors to drop by, learn a bit about the area, and meet people in a fun, friendly setting. Tea and oatcakes will be served. There's no need to register for any of the evenings, and all (including families and children) are welcome. Here's the lineup:

July 8th: Cape Breton Fiddling: Cape Breton fiddler Paul Cranford has promoted local traditional music as a performer, music publisher, and writer. Paul will give a brief history of the evolution of Cape Breton fiddling, play examples of the different types, and discuss various ways of learning fiddle music.

July 15th: Black Bears: Come and meet one of Cape Breton's most impressive inhabitants: The Black Bear! Paul Koziel of the Nova Scotia Department of Natural Resources will give us a glimpse into the

world of this elusive creature.

July 22nd: Englishtown Ferry: Ferries have taken people across the waters of St. Ann's Bay since the 1800s. Join Captain Nelson Edge for a fascinating look at the history of ferry service at Englishtown.

July 29th: Kidston Island: It's a great place to swim, sail, and hike - but Kidston Island also has a rich and interesting history. Victoria County Archivist Joan MacInnes will take us back in time to explore the roots of this popular summer recreation spot.

August 5th: Historic Baddeck: The tiny Village of Baddeck has been strongly influenced by the creative minds of Alexander and Mabel Bell and other innovators. Authour Jocelyn Bethune will bring Baddeck's history to life through photographs and anecdotes, and share the contributions of its famous (and not-so-famous) inhabitants.

August 12th: Petrified Wood: Find out about petrified wood - the ancient, fossilized remains of plants and trees. Robert Campbell is a Kempt Head resident who has studied petrified wood for decades. He'll share his interest in this fascinating material and show us examples from his collection.

August 19th: "Scoggie": Join us for a screening of a vintage National Film Board film about a young Cape Breton man's struggle to maintain his way of life in the land he loves. Made in 1978, the film remains an interesting and relevant commentary on Cape Breton culture and resilience.

August 26th: Love Your Lobster!: Find out all about this iconic Maritime creature. Where does it live? How is it caught? And how the heck do you open one? Lobster lover and restaurateur Harold Montgomery gives us an up close and personal look at this colourful crustacean.
