

Give blood, save lives

Approximately every minute of every day, someone in Canada needs blood. Even though one blood donation - in just one hour - can save up to three lives, the summer months remain a challenging time for blood collection.

With warm weather come vacation and family outings. We often forget the importance of blood donation when trips to the beach and barbeques at the cottage are top of mind.

Fifty-two per cent of Canadians say that they, or a family member, have needed blood or blood products for surgery or medical treatment.

Doctors Nova Scotia wants to remind people that the demand for blood remains the same during the summer months. Making an appointment to give blood is only the first step, honouring that appointment is what saves lives.

One in two Canadians is eligible to donate blood. If you're a first time donor you must be between the ages of 17 and 61. You must be a least 50 kg (110 lb) and in general good health and feeling well in order to donate. All types of blood are needed and you can give blood every 56 days. This summer doctors in the province encourage Nova Scotians to make a donation and give the gift of life.
